This was particularly helpful when things got personally tough for me in Senior cycle. Whenever a class got too much for me or if something was racing in my mind, I always came down to AA to calm myself down, have a cup of tea and talk to either



Ms Heneghan or Ms McMenamin about how I was feeling. I always feel like something in my head is fighting to get out of it whenever I get that isolated feeling and the teachers always provide emotional support which helped me pull through and calm down a lot.

After my friends left the school, I decided to finally talk to people and get involved

in all the activities at the end of third year and throughout Transition Year. This turned out to be one of the best decisions I've ever made in my life as I made loads of new mates who like me for who I am. One night that especially showed me that I have changed a lot since my first day was when I was a presenter at the school talent show with my friend, Lara Walsh Fagherazzi, in TY which, to put it lightly, boosted my confidence heavily. I'm proud of the lad that I have become today since my first day in Ratoath College and Aonad Arkle. I don't feel disabled nor do I feel the need to be changed. Despite being a very awkward lad, I like being an Aspie and it would be like changing the colour of my eyes.




What's your most embarrassing moment as a teacher?

Ireland is set to miss both its 2020 and 2030 climate change deadlines, leaving us ranked one of the lowest in Europe for tackling climate change. Our planet is warmer than it has been in 800,000 years and at the rate we are going Climate Change will be completely irreversible by 2030. More than 1 mil species



face extinction. Typically, the expected rate of species extinction is usually around 5 species a year, we're currently losing up to 10,000 times the normal rate – this means that dozens of species go extinct every single day.

Aside from the obvious, Climate Change is also effecting human life. As global temperatures increase, millions of people are fleeing their homes to avoid the impacts of droughts and extreme storms. And these numbers are set to rise. The International Organisation on Migration estimates that up to 200 million people could be displaced by climate change by 2050.

The UN has warned that marine life faces irreparable damage from the millions of tonnes of plastic waste that ends up in the oceans every year. Half of the world's coral reefs have died in the last 30 years, and two thirds of the Great Barrier Reef have been damaged by coral bleaching – this happens when the sea temperature is too high.

Yet lately, there has been a positive shift in the atmosphere. Student led strikes have taken the world by storm in over 51 countries across the globe. Students are rising and striking, demanding action from governments to set regulations and give this crisis the attention it deserves. And our efforts are not going unnoticed! As of May

Next was Brunelleschi's dome (Duomo di Firenze) and a bell tower by Giotto. This monumental cathedral took over 100 years to built and is the tallest building in Florence to

We also briefly looked at the Florence baptistery doors which feature incredibly detailed sculptures on each of the doors with over 18 panels on some doors depicting both the old and New Testament and some of these doors took over 21 years to complete!

Day two began in Florence again, today we would travel to Piazza Della Signoria, the main square of Florence full of medieval history, architecture and art. We first travelled to Santa Maria del Carmine to visit the Brancacci Chapel. This is known as the Sistine Chapel of the early renaissance as frescos and sculpture decorate the inside of the chapel. It is famous for the fresco cycle of Scenes from life of St. Peter, one of Ms. O'Neills favorites.





We walked through the beautiful streets of Florence back to the Piazza Della Signoria where we visited the Uffizi Gallery. The Uffizi gallery is the most famous art museum in the world with artworks such as 'The birth of Venus", "Laocoön and his Sons" a treat for both the Art and Classics students. We also visited Orsanmichelle, a church that features fourteen sculptures of stone and bronze done by famous Renaissance artists, like Donatello.




silver and 6 bronze) and 4 team relay medals (1 gold/2 silver and 1 bronze).


The second year boys also competed very well and were very unlucky not to win against Brefni College in the regional semi final. They had successful wins against Coláiste na Hinse and Beaufort College.


Mr O'Toole was behind every successful Sports Day or Musi-


The raffle was held by the TY students and presenters and hugely supported by our parents association and local businesses who generously donated prizes.




Teacher Soccer Tournament

On the 1st of May the robot games team (sporting the bright colours of Ratoath College) headed down to Galway to partake in the annual Robot Games championship. Showcasing the hard work from students and teachers alike, this is a great event for all to partake in. The event was sponsored by EA and Colmac Robotics.



A sizeable collection of students started work earlier this year in our school. Huge efforts were put into design and material choice, as well as research from other events fantastic robots. Work commenced after each team had chosen an idea. Some made use of the metalwork rooms materials while others chose for a lightweight 3D printed design (of which was created from scratch) with both materials being equally as competitive. Great skills and craftsmanship were showcased throughout the creation process which included paper thin robot wedges and different wheel and track line-ups, showing outside the box thinking and creativity.

There's something for everyone in Robot Games as it is not just making a physical piece but includes coding to programme the robot to operate through its genie motherboard. Coding is simple and easy to learn but can also be as creative as the physical design of the piece.

Within Robot Games there are two categories. The more popular event Mini Sumo pits two robots who battle to remove each other from the ring and the Line Follower category which is designed for robots programmed to follow a line quickly and accurately.

Within a sumo match every robot is limited to certain specifications for fairness. Motors output power are regulated and the same in every robot. The robot must be 100 by 100 mm but has no height restriction. Robots cannot have physical weapons which means no flamethrowers for all you lunatic engineers out there!



Sumo Robots are not allowed to leave the ring and wins when the other robot does so or gets pushed out. Matches are a best of three and matches go through loser brackets and winner brackets to get to finals. Those who win receive trophies and a selection of prizes from EA whom sponsor the event.



Artist Research

1st year art students were introduced to a range of traditional and contemporary artists this year. Looking at the work of Edward Hopper, Chuck Close, Vincent Van Gogh, to name a few. Students researched and discovered a range of information and visual aids in their understanding of each particular artist.



Through their research students found a new appreciation and understanding of individual artists. They began to understand and value the role an artist plays in society and in history. Students became more aware of the artists role and status. Taking influence from artists that have come before them students began to reflect and question the world around them.






Senior Cycle 5th Year Art
