


















RANG GROGAN


Pride and Prejudice by Jane Austen


One of Us is Lying by Karen M. McManus


They Both Die At The End by Adam Silvera


Moonrise by Sarah Crossan

or the Leaving Cert Geography course, all students must attend a trip and write up a field study about it as a part of their grade. Due to the circumstances this year we were unsure whether the trip would go ahead but fortunately because of the ease of restrictions at the time we were able to go. This project is worth 20% of our grade so it was vital that we were able to go and give our full participation. Our field study was to go to a river and investigate two specific processes of erosion on the shaping of a meander. We went to the Bunnoe River in County Cavan.

A lot of planning and preparation went into the trip. Before the trip we revised the Rivers chapter in our Geography book, viewed the site of our investigation on Google Maps, checked the weather for the day of our trip and designed record sheets to take down all the information we gather on the day. We divided ourselves up into groups of 4 or 5 to do the investigations.

The investigations included 1. Measuring the Width and Depth of the River, 2. Measuring the Velocity of the River, 3. Evidence of Undercutting and 4. Bedload analysis.





The morning of our trip it was an early, freezing cold day. We were all so cold and were trying to convince our other group members to get into the river and brave the elements because none of us wanted to. Once we got there we were brought into a classroom and were told what the day would entail. We were split into two separate groups and then got two bus to the sites of the river where we would do our investigations.

There was an equipment box given to us with all the materials needed to carry out our investigations and we brought our record sheets we designed to take down all the information we were about to gather.

There were four different tasks that we had to complete:

The first task we had to complete was measuring the width and depth of the river channel. Some of the members of each group had to get into the river with a measuring tape and a meter stick in order to get the width and depth.



The second task was to measure the velocity of the river. We used a hydro prop and a stopwatch to calculate the speed of the river on both the inside and the outside of the meander. The speed of the river was faster on the outside then the inside which shows that erosion is taking place.

The third task was to see if there was any evidence of undercutting, which there was. We found this out by putting a metre stick horizontally into the riverbank.

Finally, we carried out a bedload analysis. The group members in the river picked up rocks from both the inside and outside of the meander bend. Sediment of a certain size would not be present where velocity and power to erode is at its greatest. This proves erosion is more active in the outer bend and deposition on the inner bend.

We got back to the centre and the group of people who were in the river went to get changed into some dry clothes and huddle around the radiators to warm up. We then went back into the classroom and began to draft up diagrams from the information we had gathered.

For the next few weeks in school after the trip we began to write up our drafts for our field study project. We wrote about our Aims, Planning, Gathering of Information, Results and Conclusion for the field study.

Overall, it was a memorable trip and we had lots of fun gathering the information for our filed study. Although we all dreaded getting into the freezing cold river on a cold Autumn morning, it ended up being hilarious and we all had a great laugh about it. We would highly recommend choosing geography for the leaving cert as the project is not only enjoyable but also an easy way of getting 20% before you have even sat your exam.

HOW I STARTED EMBROIDERY AND Why I continue.





What you will need:

Embroidery needles Embroidery floss Embroidery Hoop Fabric with a tight weave e.g. cotton Fabric scissors Paper Pen/Heat erasable pen Light Box / Light source Felt (Hoop Backing)

Getting started:

1) Plan your design on the paper 2) Place the fabric securely in the hoop 3) On the light source place the design paper then the hooped fabric and using a pen draw out the design onto the fabric 4) Cut a strand of floss (around arm length), split the strand of floss into 2 parts, each with 3 threads and tie a knot at the end 5) Thread the needle and start stitching



Backing on the hoop (other methods are available on YouTube):

1) Make sure no thread is unsecured 2)Take fabric out of hoop 3)Place a piece of felt below the fabric 4)Put the hoop back on and secure it making sure the design is outwards and centred 5)Cut the felt 1 cm around the hoop 6)Cut the fabric 1 inch around the hoop 7)Using a running stitch go around the fabric 8)Pull the tread tight so the fabric closes in 9)Tie a knot to keep the tread tight 10)Done!!



Benefits of Embroidery and Sewing

Improving Creativity

Making the patterns and designs that get embroidered allows people to display their personal creativity and branch out into new art styles.

Relieves Stress

The repetitive motion of pulling the thread in and out is considered to be very relaxing. Patience is also developed due to the long sewing time of a singular small project. Embroidery is not an art form that can be done quickly so taking time to properly place each stitch is necessary. The drawn out process can calm the mind.

Develops fine motor skills

Holding on to a fine needle and being able to direct your fingers to a small specific location is a skill that is not used in many activities but that can strengthen the connection between the eyes and the fingers.

MOVING FROM TY TO 5TH YEAR Article by sorcha broe-brady

Going into Senior Cycle is a scary and confusing time for everyone. No one knows how they will get on in the stressful time and can only hope they are prepared to face the demon of Leaving Cert head on with the aim of coming out victorious. I can't speak for everyone in this article but I will do the best to show how the change has went for myself and have asked some of my fellow TY, now 5th Year classmates to give some tips that they have gathered during their first few months of 5th.

The end of my TY year was all online and by that point the teachers just provided us with one final project to finish off the month. This meant that I had essentially a 6 month summer break in which I had no set schedule to follow and was just staying around my house. Going back to the school building after this was very hard for me, as I suspect it was for most people. On the first day back I showed up at school, mask on and was totally lost on where I was supposed to meet with our teachers. This time was nerve wrecking and it didn't instantly get better. Once the initial organisation of students had happened we were led to our base rooms. Mine just happened to be the long upstairs gym in which it is very hard to see others. Due to the masks and social distancing necessary to provide a safe school environment, it was very hard to talk to people in which I had never spoken with especially the old 3rd Years as I had never even shared a class with them. The first day probably went similar in every year group so l won't say any more on it.

Settling in to class was the next step. I believe in the first week alone I went to 'Forever Amber' at least 4 times for different subjects. In TY I just had one big copy that I had sectioned off for different subjects so I had pretty much forgotten about the book list and the amount of copies needed. Luckily the teachers have experience with first week forgetfulness and didn't mind when I said that I would have it for the next class. For Physics and Applied Maths I still just have a small copy as on the first day of both the classes I forgot to bring a manuscript copy but found the small ones in my bag. The teachers don't mind the size of the copy as long as you pay attention.

Creating a study plan was my next stage. I went into it with good intentions and wrote out a plan that had at least 3 different subjects per day with the sessions spread evenly throughout the week. After TY I thought I could just put my head down and get the work done. I have no clue about anyone else but I didn't even last 2 days with it. Studying is different for everyone and can change depending on what is coming up. I had to adapt so that I could get all my homework done on time and properly as doing homework is a part of studying. Taking notes in class is also something that cannot be undervalued. It is much easier to go back later when preparing for a test in English and look at the Bishop notes that you took down and truly understood rather than looking through the PowerPoint the teacher used to start explaining the poet. Talking to individual subject teachers about the best strategy in their subject is probably best but also after the first while if one of your friends is doing well in the topic you might want to ask them what they're doing as sometimes they have thought of something the teacher hasn't.

I know that my experience with the transition is different from others so I have collected together a bunch of tips given by other 5th Years about what they thought helped them settle in the most.

Tips from past TYs now 5th Years

Try and stay positive even when you don't get a grade you were hoping for/expecting because the Leaving Cert content is different to the Junior Cert and it's been a while since you've done proper exam subjects

Try to get to know as many people in your classes as possible even if you're not in a class with lots of your friends because everyone is in the same boat and is probably hoping someone will approach them.

Make sure you're organised with the correct books, copies and folders as it makes it much easier to stay on track as it is unlike TY where you could survive with just one copy.

You just have to accept that the first month or so will be difficult adjusting and that's okay. It is normal to find it difficult.


You're going to be sick of hearing it, but seriously, just stay on top of your homework. I'm not saying do it the day you get it, but yeah, do it the day you get it. It helps a lot! It keeps you structured and stops working from piling up around you. You don't want to reach Sunday night and suddenly have six different subjects to work on. It may be hard getting back into the habit, but it's worth it in the long run, I promise.






OUR RATOATH College odyssey

hird year students were asked to pick any topic from the Junior Cycle Business Course and to do a research project on it. Many chose Entrepreneurship and researched a very successful entrepreneur. One student decided to look at taxation in Ireland and to research where exactly our money goes. Read on to learn more and get some tips for your own future business!

TAXATION IN IRELAND

I chose to do this research project on the taxes we pay in Ireland. I picked this because I want to research and find where most of the money goes, what taxes and how we pay them. I used desk research to gather my information, as I think it works best and I got information faster.

In Ireland taxes are collected by the office of the revenue commissioners on behalf of the government. The main roles of the revenues are to collect taxes, collect duties on imports and provide information on taxation issues.

There are direct and indirect taxes. Direct taxes are taxes on income (corporation tax) indirect taxes are taxes on expenditure (VAT)

In Ireland you will be taxed through the PAYE (pay as you earn) system this means when you are paid a percentage of your income is deducted by income tax, PRSI and USC. The remainder is taxed at about 40%. The more money you earn the higher you will be taxed.

The main purpose of Taxation is to raise finance for the government expenditure. Money from taxes can be distributed for the social good like homeless, unemployed, people living with illness. The government has revenues and spends it on services (health, education, welfare).

The money you pay in taxes goes to many places. In addition to paying the salaries of government workers, your tax also helps to support common resources, such as police and firefighters.

I learned that there are many taxes people pay that I didn't know of and that taxes can be high but the government spends it on goods/ services that we need. Over all I think taxes are a smart way to get revenue for the government/economy.

Who is Jeff Bezos?

Jeffrey Preston Bezos is an American internet entrepreneur and investor. Bezos is the founder and CEO of the multi-national technology company Amazon. He is the richest person in the world according to the Forbes real times Billionaires ranking.

Bezos showed an early interest in how things work turning his parents shed into a laboratory and rigging electrical items around his house as a child. He moved to Miami with his family as a teenager where he developed a passion for computers and graduated valedictorian of his high school.

So what is Amazon?

Amazon is an American multinational technology company based in Seattle which focuses on e-commerce, cloud computing, digital streaming, and artificial intelligence. It was founded on July 5th 1994.

How much does Jeff Bezos make?

Each day it is estimated that he makes \$321million which is \$3,715 per second! Each year he makes an estimated sixteen billion six hundred ninety-two million.

Why the name Amazon?

Jeff Bezos thought of the name Amazon because he liked the idea of it being named after the longest river in the world


IS THIS THE DIFFERENCE WE NEED?: NUIG ECO TRACKER



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



One of the artists that stood out to us all was Holly Pareira, and we were very lucky that our teacher Ms.O'Neill was able to have her come to talk to us about her work.

olly Pereira is a muralist from Dublin. She studied sculpture in NCAD and later went on to study animation in Ballyfermot. Taking to murals 5 years ago, Holly takes her inspiration from many different places, such as books. One of the books she told us about was "Where's Wally", how she loved the way the pages were crowded with different people, and how there were so many different narratives.

B eing Irish-Singaporean, and from travelling to many different places such as Singapore and Mexico, Holly noticed that the streets of these places were always bright and filled with colour, something that she wanted to bring home with her to Dublin. She told us all about the places she enjoys doing her work, places in Dublin like East wall and Terenure.

ne of Holly's first works was based around the repeal the 8th referendum back in 2016. She told us all about what it entails to be a muralist, her struggles of having to work through the winter months and having to use a wheelbarrow to move her equipment from place to place. Because street art is not a formal industry, she said it's really nice





to have the support of fellow muralists. It took Holly over a year for her career as a muralist to take off. and she used time lapses of her working on a piece to earn her recognition. She told us she's very passionate about her work. and that street art is special to her because she loves the scale of the canvas. Holly finds it very special that she gets to work on a piece that's bigger than her body, although in the future she aspires to set up a second career path in animation and independent filmmaking.

olly takes inspiration from lots of different places. She uses her art to project her voice on many social issues that she believes in. She has done several works highlighting the issues of racism, housing rights, and the 8th amendment, which is very important to her.

olly taught us all about the different mediums she uses in her artwork, and the different techniques she uses in her pieces. She showed us how she uses drop shadows and cast shadows in her work, along with







hatching to create depth. She explained to us how she makes gifs, and how she uses adobe cooler to markup her work and to make prints and paintings.

Another topic we discussed was the technology divide in the region. Not all schools agreed on the use of iPads but they felt very lost when stuck at home with no access to one.

This online day was invaluable to us as we learned how to better represent students and gave us some new and exciting ideas for the coming years. We also reviewed the Code of Behaviour and the students Internet Safety Policy. We studied these and gave our feedback to the school management. The Student Council have to have a chance to review all school policies before they can be ratified to make sure that students' interests are being upheld.

We would like to thank all of our representatives this year for their amazing job in helping the student council. We would also like to thank Ms.Quinn for volunteering her time to help out and to help turn our ideas into reality. As a student council we'd like to wish you all well with the Coronavirus and hope you all enjoy your summer despite the change in our lives, and we look forward to getting back to normality next year.
