Our 1st years and 5th year students are all involved in this project. Next year our 1st,2nd and 5th and 6th year mathematicians will be involved.


La semaine Française

The N.C.C.A. 'Fón' Project

The project began following a visit from Dr. Ann Looney (CEO) of the N.C.C.A. in March 2006 as part of the colleges 'Visitors' Programme'. In their discussion with Dr. Looney, the students of Ratoath discussed how they considered how I.T., and in particular, mobile phones would be an invaluable tool for learning languages particularly Irish.

The project began in earnest from then on and is now, at present in Phase 2. Nine other schools are participating in Phase 2 and Phase, 3 in Northern Ireland and 3 in the South. This has been a very successful learning initiative for Ratoath College. Two students along with their muinteoir Gaeilge Áine Ní Bhrolcháin were chosen to attend the N.C.C.A. /C.C.E.C. conference in Cavan in January '09 which was held to assess the impact of their pilot project entitled 'Fón'.

This project sees teachers incorporate mobile phones into the teaching and learning strategies and methodologies in Irish. It has been very successful in Ratoath College to date. The college was the first and only school to participate in the Phase 1 of the project in 2007.

Jeaic Wiley, Edel An Chnoic and their Irish Teacher were chosen to present their findings on the project to the Council. The presentation was a great success and students and Muinteoirí Gaeilge.

The project has been entered into the national Euro Languages Competition and Ratoath College has been short-listed to the final 15 schools. We look forward to beginning Phase 3 in September 2009.

Online Bullying

Some 22% of Irish teens have experienced online bullying, with four out of ten experiencing it frequently, according to a recent Microsoft Ireland summary published in February. In Ratoath College we acknowledge this phenomenon and have put in place preventative measures through our Anti-bullying programme.

Seven out of ten teens who have experienced bullying online experienced it while instant messaging, and under just under half were bullied on social networking sites. One worrying statistic arising out of the report was that 76% of those surveyed have never reported online bullying, and 52% believe the internet makes it easier to bully. When asked who they would report bullying to, 41% of those surveyed would approach their friends first for advice while 33% would turn to their parents.

Another report by the Anti-Bullying Centre in Trinity College Dublin has found that girls were more likely to fall victim to cyber bullying than boys, with one in five female respondents claiming to have been cyber bullied.

Cyber bullying can in some instances prove more damaging than traditional or offline bullying according to Dr Seamus Sweeney, special lecturer in Psychiatry at St Vincent's University Hospital, UCD. "Cyber bullying can have immediate and permanent consequences," according to Dr Sweeney. "People from outside a person's social circle can see it". He said victims of cyber bullying could feel as though the universe they created online had been invaded. "For young people a Bebo page or a MySpace page is literally their space. It's a place to express themselves." said Dr Sweeney. He said that in some way if a student is being bullied at school they can get away from it when they go home at the end of the day but that it was more difficult to escape cyber bullying.

With this in mind it is important for students to know that supports are in place in Ratoath College for students who may have fallen victim to bullying or know someone who is being bullied. Our Anti-bullying programme, as established by the Anti-bullying team, has implemented the following strategies:

- Anti-bullying zoom day
- Sticks and stone workshop
- School leadership team workshops. (This involved our TY Mentors giving anti-bullying presentations to first year students)
- Anti-bullying poster competition
- SPHE classes on bullying and its effects
- Peer Mediation

Canteen News

Ratoath College recognises that healthy food plays an important part in student's learning and performance and so has started looking at providing canteen facilities for the student body. Together, School Management and the Parents Association have been involved in piloting a number of options available to the school, in an attempt to determine the needs of the students and to highlight the course of action which should be taken in the future to fulfil these needs.

After Christmas, the first pilot scheme was introduced where local business SPAR (Corbalis) sold a selection of soups, sandwiches & rolls, scones, fruit and bottled water to students. This scheme operated a voucher system replacing cash. The second pilot scheme commenced after the Easter Break. This scheme is run by a company called "LunchPak" and it provides sandwiches, wraps & rolls, soup, pasta dishes, popcorn, bottled water and milkshakes. Students pay for the products using cash.

The school is very proud of its Healthy Eating Policy and this is reflected in the canteen facilities provided for the students. To date these facilities have been very popular among both staff and students and we look forward to continuing this success in the future.

The Re-defining Art Group

The Re-defining Art Group was set up by Ms. Hynes in 2007. This is an exciting and dynamic group who are keen to make Ratoath College look its best with art work and exciting projects. This year we undertook many projects such as the "Ratoath College School Calendar", the "Christmas Theme in Ratoath College" and our very romantic "Valentines Day Rolo Theme".

The group are currently working on designing a visual display for the main entrance of the school to be presented on our official opening evening. This 'Welcoming Display' with catch the attention of every visitor to Ratoath College and will greet them in many different languages. Students from other countries in this school with also be represented by their countries flag and we hope to add to the collection of flags for many years to come.

The Irish Dancing Club was founded by Ms. Hynes and started in 2006 in Fairyhouse Racecourse. Every





Young Social Innovators

In September the Transition Year class began the Young Social Innovators module. They began the year by looking at different social issues through examining news reports and local newspapers. The area they chose to investigate was the facilities available for the young people of Ratoath. They then took part in a survey which was based on facilities in Ratoath and how young people felt about them. The results of this survey confirmed the beliefs of the YSI class; that the village is in need of a social facility for teenagers between 15 and 18 years of age.

In order to move this project forward the YSI group joined forces with CRY (Challenging Ratoath Youth), a group of adults from the community who want to develop amenities for teenagers in Ratoath. During the first public meeting which took place in early November in the community centre,

members of the community who wanted to become involved in this area came together to put forward their ideas, including Mary Wallace, Nick Killian, members of Foróige and the Garda Síochána. It was decided that the next public meeting would be chaired by the young people so the YSI class asked for the help of Joanne O'Brien from Foróige. She came to the school and helped the TYs to set an agenda, pick a chairperson and secretary and prepare for the meeting, which was very successful. At this point, a core committee was set up, consisting of five adults and five young people, who have led the way since then in making plans to set up a Youth Facility in Ratoath.



Having visited Corduff Youth Café and investigating available grant possibilities, the YSI class asked Mary Wallace and Yvonne from her constituency office to meet with them in the school. This visit was a great success, thanks to the hard work of the visitors, for obtaining information on the statistics of young people in Ratoath, as well as several other issues to be considered in setting up a Youth Café.

The next step was to put together a business plan for the venture, in order to apply for various funding such as the Leader Programme through Meath Partnership. Some of the TYs spent their community work experience week compiling this with other community members, having already surveyed all senior students on the facilities and resources they would like to see in the Youth Facility 'Pulse'.



In February, the class presented their project to the North Leinster schools at a Speak Out Forum in Knightsbrook Hotel, Trim, where they also opened the proceedings with a great performance of music and song. As part of the YSI class also, the group set up a movie night in the Venue with the support of Nick Killian which was a great success. While some grants have been applied for, the students have already been involved in fundraising efforts and hope to continue these in the future.

The group's project was selected to exhibit at a National Showcase in the RDS in May, where they were excellent representatives of the school both on the stage and at their exhibition stand. They were invited to pitch their project in the Dragon's Den at the Showcase and the students up for the job were Philip, Cian and Scott. The boys managed to impress the Dragons enough for them to offer the Y.S.I. class €1,500 towards their fundraising efforts; **Well done to the whole group!!**

Growth Areas in recessionary times!

Given all the economic doom and gloom that is highlighted in the news headlines almost daily, students should not be entirely disheartened as to their future job prospects. There are a number of sectors in our economy which could be classified as 'growth areas' offering potential employment prospects for those of you with an interest and an aptitude for these areas.

Careers in Technology

Ireland has been facing a growing shortage of graduates in technical disciplines, even though computer scientists, electronic engineers, and IT professionals have excellent career options.

According to a recent report from IDC, a leading consultancy firm, this lack of graduates in technology is forcing high-tech firms to recruit from overseas. This confirms the alarming gap between the supply of Irish-trained graduates and the demand from the Information and Communications Technology (ICT) sector. Official figures from the CAO show that the decline in interest in technology/computers is evident as numbers of students accepting third level computing places fell from 4,097 in 2000 to only 1,791 last year. Director of ICT Ireland, Kathryn Raleigh, says the figures have prompted alarm within the industry. "This is happening at a time when the high-tech sector is increasing in importance and offering more employment opportunities."

She added that "Graduate salaries in the sector are very attractive. According to the HEA graduate survey, 16.5pc of graduates with engineering degrees now earn €33,000 or more."

Students interested in this area of ICT have an abundance of choices at third level as there are over 100 ICT-related courses, offered at all levels through the CAO process. Apart from computer degrees, which are widely available from both the universities and institutes of technology, there are computer and software engineering options, computer games programmes, software development programmes, multimedia courses, computer network and systems courses, digital media programmes and computer science with a language options. Details of all these courses are available on www.qualifax.ie or from your School Guidance Counsellor.

Points for honours degree programmes (Level 8) currently range from 250-350, although a small number of programmes will require 400-450 points. At certificate and ordinary degree level (Level 6 & Level 7), courses are on offer from as low as 100 points, to in or about 200 points.

All of the above indicates that there are genuine employment opportunities for technology graduates in the future. Students who pursue a third level course in a technical discipline may have employment opportunities as a electronics engineer, software engineer, computer/IT consultant, computer analyst/programmer, applications developer, database administrator, information systems manager, IT trainer, multimedia programmer, systems/business analyst, technical support officer, information scientist, IT sales professional, multimedia specialist, network engineer, and technical author.

Many of the world's leading technology companies have operations in Ireland, which employ a very high proportion of graduates. Google has created hundreds of high-quality jobs for technology graduates. Graduates are also employed in software development in Microsoft, Oracle, Iona Technologies, Hewlett Packard and Havok; in hardware design and manufacturing with Dell, Hewlett Packard and Xilinx; and in the telecommunications sector with Vodafone, Ericsson and Eircom.

Sustainable Energy

Going green and the lingering doubt over the global deposits of oil have contributed to the worldwide pursuit of alternative energy sources. As a result Sustainable Energy is the buzzwords at the moment and this sector is widely reported as one which will experience growth rates well ahead of National averages.

Over 10,000 people are already employed in the energy sector in Ireland. The National Development Plan (2007-2013) has place a strong focus on addressing energy issues by allocating €8.6 billion for energy. Ireland has also published an Energy White Paper for the first time in thirty years with targets for energy efficiency (20% energy savings by 2020) and for renewable energy usage in electricity (33% renewable energy penetration by 2020), in heat (12% by 2020) and in transport (10% bio fuels penetration). Globally the International Energy Agency (IEA) estimates €20 trillion invested in the energy sector over the period 2005 - 2030.

Third level courses currently available in this sector include Energy and Environmental Engineering in IT Tallaght, and Mechanical and Renewable Energies Engineering in Athlone IT. New courses announced in April include a Bachelor of Engineering in Energy Systems in NUI Galway and Galway-Mayo IT has also launched an Energy Engineering programme. Similar courses are expected to come on line in the future to respond to the growing needs of the market. Alternatively, students could also study any engineering degree and then specialise in sustainable or renewable energy for postgraduate study.



packed but some of us for the night time. We went


to a buffet dinner and we talked about the past week.

to see him to go. St. Kevin's are a very lucky school and we wish him the best of luck in his new position.






Eoin O'Connor, on form and widely tipped to retain his title was eventually knocked out at the quarter
