
Very Positive Results From Our First Ever Whole School Inspection




Artsem Saldatsenka (1 Ó hEocaidh) also won two medals this year. He took bronze at international Judo competitions in Southend and Belgium.





There aren't many schools that can boast about having one of the top athletes in the world as one of their students, but Swim Ireland Disability Swimmer of the Year James Scully, ranked in the world's top five in his discipline, means Ratoath College is the exception to this rule. As James prepares for his Leaving Cert and for the London games next year, he took some time out to talk to 66 about his life as an athlete and his plans for the future...

How did you first get interested in swimming? Was it through your family or because you were interested in it yourself?

Yes, I liked swimming but it wasn't until my dad suggested it and we went to a nearby competition that I got into it.

How many years have you been swimming for now? Has it been hard?

I have been swimming competitively for 6 years but at senior international level for 2 years. Yeah it has been very hard! It has been a rollercoaster of a journey for me with many ups and downs. Swimming is an extremely demanding sport and takes a lot out of you.

What have you achieved this year?

So far this year I have managed to keep my performances consistent remaining inside the top 5 in the world despite the Leaving Cert. I have qualified for the European championships which will

take place in July, and I have also achieved qualifying times in 5 events for the Paralympic games in 2012!

Do you have to train lots?

Yes! This year I am still keeping 5 sessions a week, totalling 10 hours, however once the leaving cert ends I will return to 16 hours a week. The training is extremely demanding and requires a huge amount of concentration and commitment!

What's the worst injury you've had from swimming?

As a non-contact sport swimming doesn't usually cause many injuries, however I am still suffering from a neck injury almost two years after pulling the muscles there.

And what would you consider your greatest achievement to date?

This year I won swim Ireland Disability Swimmer Of The Year 2010/2011!



Have you had to make many sacrifices to pursue your interest in swimming?

Yes! Almost everything in my life except school comes second to my sport, therefore I don't have as much free time for socialising or partying. Also, as an athlete I have to watch what I put in so I can't afford to enjoy as many "treats"!

Do you have any heroes that inspire you to work so hard at this?

The Dutch swimmer and Olympic champion Pieter Van Den Hoogenband is my ultimate role model. He is a middle distance swimmer just like me. Also my head coach Dave Malone is my true hero! He is arguably the most successful Irish



Paralympic swimmer with 3 Olympic medals from 4 consecutive Paralympic games and 3 world records!

What are your hopes for the future in relation to sport? What's the plan for next year and in the long term?

Well my goal this year is to perform and represent my country to the best of my ability at Europeans as a lead up to London in 2012, where I hope to final and perhaps medal. My long term future in the sport is not yet decided however I would love to foundling Ireland and maybe even make it to Rio in 2016!

This year, the conference was attended by three students from Ratoath College TY: Eoin Joyce, Christopher Waters and Ian Marron.


Preparation


TY Business Breakfast



Department Reports


Engineering and Metalwork


Religious Education

Members.





Holocaust Survivor

Tomi Reichental Visits the School

Survivor Tomi Reichental shared his and his family's experiences of the Holocaust with students

A Holocaust survivor detailed the unimaginable horror of his experience in a Nazi concentration camp during World War II to our privileged students on December 20. Describing his earliest moments following his birth in 1935 In Piestany, Slovakia, Tomi Reichental gave an insight into Nazi occupied Poland through the eyes of a child.

Tomi began by saying he grew up in a world where Jews had no citizenship. The Nuremberg Laws were passed the year of his birth and his people were excluded from everything. Nazi Germany under Hitler were intent on creating the Aryan race, and set about creating an abhorrence of all things Jewish across Europe.

Tomi was 4 years old when the Nazis invaded Poland and the mass execution of Jews began. He explained to students how the Slovak government sold their own people to the Nazis under laws even more severe than the Nuremberg Laws. Tomi was 6 years old when the Nazis made Jews wear a yellow star on their clothing emblazoned with the letters 'Jude'. As Tomi stuck this to his fleece he reminisced on how he got bullied by his schoolmates because of this yellow star.

The expulsion of Slovakia's Jews to the death camps began in March 1942. Slovak leaders even paid 500 marks for every Jew they departed. Tomi explained how he watched his aunts and cousins being led away not knowing 48 hours later they would die in the gas chambers in Auschwitz.

Tomi and his family came face to face with the Nazi regime when a unit of SS swooped on their tiny vil-



lage. Tomi's father was taken to Auschwitz. After the war Tomi learned that his father had survived by jumping off a moving train en route. The Gestapo came across Tomi's Grandmother in a shop in Bratislava. They beat her up until she gave them details of her family.

When they came for Tomi's family, his brother lied about being Jewish until they began to beat Tomi. Tomi and 4 of his remaining family bound for Bergan Belsen in a cattle carriage with 60 other people in November 1944.

Tomi and his family arrived at a wooden barrack with bunk beds drenched and exhausted. Every morning he awoke to the shrieks of a whistle and sometimes stood up for 2 hours until the SS commander arrived. When people died of hunger and illness the dead bodies were slung into a heap outside the barracks. Tomi being a child just played around them as he knew no different. All he cared about was not becoming one of the decaying corpses.

Tomi explained how food at the Nazi camp was contaminated. He lived on a diet of black coffee, bread, and turnips. He said how some people could not bear the torture of starvation and would climb the barbed wire, before being shot dead.

Tomi described liberation from the Nazis in April 1945 to our students. He explained how one day the camp gates were left open but no one left in fear. Then some jeeps rolled in and the Allies began to film the horrid camp conditions. Tomi returned home and was re-united with his father.

RC TEACHERS REPRESENT IRELAND AT GLOBAL INNOVATIVE EDUCATORS FORUM



This hugely prestigious competition recognised the great work done by the Transition Year Media Studies students in their innovative and highly accredited MyStudyMate project. Representing the school were teachers Mr. Walsh and Ms. Hynes. Having breezed through the Irish and European Finals, the project faced stiff competition from various innovative teaching and learning projects from around the world at the week long conference/forum.

During their time in South Africa, both teachers attended several conferences, presentations and workshops and got to see first hand, the many innovative practices in operation in classrooms throughout the world.

The project itself made it to the final round of 8 (out of a total of over 250,000 entries from 32 different countries), but that is where the journey ended as the project was placed in the 4th—8th place bracket.

The South African School, Bonteheuwelhs High School, where more than half of the students are living in Niall Mellon built houses, are currently finishing their Matrix exams and after this will be taking part in a number of joint projects and skype video conference classes over the coming months and years as a result of this new partnership. Ratoath College also has plans to raise some funds to help our new found friends at Bonteheuwelhs High School and we are very much looking forward to developing our partnership with them.

As with every year, everybody had a great time.


