A Reflection from Father PJ

It was while the school musical West Side Story was on that I was reminded again of a slogan used to advertise a popular film from many years ago, "Love Story", which said "Love means never having to say you're sorry". It sounds nice but I never really believed it to be true.

Perhaps, if we really loved someone we would never have to say sorry because we would never do anything to hurt that person; there would be no occasion when we would have to apologise. Things, however, are not like that. We may love somebody very much, but within all of us there is self-love and self-ishness and, all too often, instead of putting the ones we love first we think only of ourselves. Our self-love causes us to say and do things which hurt other people, even those we love. The pain and suffering that loved ones inflict on each other is immense, as I know from my ministry. Parents tell about the hurt they sometimes feel when a son/daughter is causing trouble at home. Likewise some young people have been deeply wounded and damaged by parents and adults. When we hurt someone by word or deed and then behave as if nothing had happened, just think what damage we would do. We would damage or even destroy the relationship we had had. We would also damage ourselves because we would become more and more self-centred and, eventually, we would lose the power to love anyone but ourselves.

When we have damaged a relationship through our selfishness, the only way in which it can be restored is if the failure is admitted and an apology is made. If we find the love and the courage to do that, there can be a fresh start, the relationship can be restored and healed.

Love does not mean "never having to say you're sorry". If we love we will want to heal a damaged relationship and tell the person we have hurt that we really do love and care. Love means that, when it is necessary we have the courage, the confidence and the love to say sorry.

DSPCA are caring for. Not only did they get to see domestic animals such as cats and dogs, but they



This year along with Mr. Walsh, the Transition Year students put together a video saying no to Cyber Bullying in Ratoath College.




fact, 60% of our students took maths at higher level, well above the national average of 45%.

In the entrance hall there was a magnificent

mahogany wine cooler. It was designed by Francis Johnston in 1810. It was built in the 19th century by Dublin cabinet-makers. In the State Reception Room, the centrepiece was the ceiling. It's a plaster coat of a Lanfranchini panel from Riverstown House.

The carpet was made in Donegal to the design of Raymond Mc Grath. It depicts the rising phoenix from the flames and the four heads on each of the corners represents the riverine figures of James Grandon's custom house.

The State Drawing Room is part of the original house built in 1751. The chandelier is made from brass.

The council of State Room was built in 1751 and is mostly used for receptions but it was originally a dining room.

Áras an Uachtaráin is now officially the home of Michael D. Higgins and is open to the public every Saturday. I really enjoyed being in the Áras because it had never dawned on me about the people who had passed through the doors of this famous building before me.

Moments later, more worry. A sideline near the 45 curled ominously in under Flinter's crossbar but the Ratoath keeper leapt high with the energy of a salmon starting its journey upstream to spawn and plucked the ball from the air. Battling the elements, he cleared his lines with a roar of encouragement to his beleaguered team mates.

This and the shock of going behind seemed to stun the Ratoath Heroes into action for even being behind was as anathema to them as defeat itself. The quick passing and fluid motion their committed band of followers had come to expect suddenly reappeared as Shane Clayton, outstanding at full back, began breaking up Wicklow attacks and carrying out of defence.

Building from the middle, Toner and Kelly fed the forwards where the Wallace brothers and Griffiths sprang like jacks-in-the-box for the quick ball. It was less a lack of discipline and more the sheer speed of movement of the

Ratoath forwards that led to Wicklow backs giving away frees, duly dispatched by Glen O'Reilly. Point after point, slowly but surely Ratoath edged into the lead.

But with the wind still very much at their backs, the Wicklow team sprang time and again into attack. It was in this phase of the game that Ratoath's final victory was assured.

Many supporters commented on the similarities with the Battle of the Bulge. Surrounded, much like the 101st Airborne in Bastogne, the Ratoath backs intercepted and beat back wave after wave of Wicklow attack. For some the reality began to sink in as Conor Rooney and Andy Flinter raised the the *Corn Uí Bhroinn* aloft.

Others remain incredulous.

Balladeers and poets are already hard at work penning their records of this achievement but in reality it may take these artisans many years of labour to adequately capture the grandeur and the glory of the victory.

For those who were there to see it, one thing is certain: they will remember, forever, the day Ratoath's Heroes fought their way to glory and in blood, sweat and tears etched their names squarely into the history books as the victors of the Battle of Hawkfield.



The BT YOUNG SCIENTIST 2012

This year Ratoath College was lucky enough to have a student, Mark Caffrey of Rang Kelly in second year, competing at the **BT Young**Scientist and Technology exhibition.

Mark's project was entitled "What Influences a Young Person's Political Opinions", and his project was a part of the "Social and Behavioural Sciences" section. There were 194 exhibitors in this section and just over 500 exhibits on display at the R.D.S. in Dublin. Just like every year there were a total of 4 main categories in the exhibition, these included "Social and Behavioural Sciences", "Chemical, Physical and Mathematical Sciences", "Biological and Ecological Sciences" and of course "Technology".

The competition is 49 years old now and began in 1965 in Dublin. The exhibition is hosted annually inside R.D.S. and it draws crowds not just from Ireland but also abroad. For example some of the many visitors' to Mark's exhibit came from many foreign countries including Britain, Germany, France, Australia and the United States of America (Iowa to be specific). This year's competition was very special for one highly important reason, which is because Dublin was awarded the title "European City of Science".

Students from all over Ireland compete in the competition, both north and south of the border. Approximately ¾ of projects in the exhibition came from Dublin and Cork. Believe it or not but one school (Kinsale Community College) had 17 out of 22 initial entries in the exhibition making them the most represented school this year.

As part of his project, many people from across Co Meath VEC schools took part in Mark's survey. A total of 290 gross with a final net total of 232 responses were counted, many from students in this school. This survey provided plenty of



interesting information for Mark's project and it in many cases changed how young people's political views should be seen.

The fascinating results of the project also were cross-referenced by case studies and the opinions of many politicians from across the political spectrum (excluding Sinn Féin due to the fact that their deputies didn't respond at all). Case studies included "Monopoly", for example did you know that it was invented by a true socialist who wanted to teach people the evils of capitalism! (Obviously it didn't achieve its goals). The humorous part of the story is that by the time she had made a couple of new editions of the game she couldn't afford the patents. So in the end another man stole the idea off her, sold it to Parker Brothers and became a millionaire!!

Marks project had shown that parents have a huge influence on young people's opinions and that young people aren't as left wing as you might think. For example both communism and conservatism poled equal at 9%. This also shows the vast majority of young people are either moderate on the left or right or are centrists.

Many politicians had visited Mark's exhibit and they were very keen on getting copies of the results of the survey taken by students. Of course it was probably only a general interest. God forbid that they would have wanted them to try and see if they could get some more votes in the next election!

Arts week strove to represent all aspects of the arts, world culture included. And started off at Monday's assembly with three students reading a poem in their native Polish to the school.


Tuesday brought a greatly anticipated art exhibition, in which art from students of junior and senior cycle was displayed at the Venue, the community centre found at the heart of the village.





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




TECHNOLOGY


