
Our cover this year has been created by Emily McGlynn and Katie Byrne as part of their entry into the Newgrange Winter Solstice Art Competition.

did, but people will never forget how you made them feel", and as your head girl and boy, we hope you remember us for how we made you feel.



We've stood out, scared, in storms before And prayed the rain would cool our skin But only hands could heal from burning When they turn, end, and begin.







From Dante's Inferno to Paradiso: the greatest match of all time



Stadio Grande Torino is renowned in Italian amateur football; not only for that great Torino FC team who, after winning five *Scudettos*, were all tragically killed in the Superga air disaster and who lend the stadium its name, but for the incomparable match day atmosphere it creates. "It's more like the Galatasary or Flamengo stadium" Ratoath's own Torinese staff member Emiliano Sordano warned his team mates, "the crowd there is crazy – flares and intimidating chanting are very normal."

Thus, the Rataoth College staff team could have been forgiven if they had a sense of, dare I say, fear in their hearts as they lined up alongside their Italian opponents in the tunnel under the Ferruccio Novo stand. None of this though was in evidence as the stadium announcer's shrill voice beckoned the teams onto the pitch. Led by team captain, Mr McAuley, the Ratoath charges were a picture of confidence as they jogged out. Mr Mooney paused momentarily to bless himself with the grass of the sideline in time honoured fashion, appealing to the Almighty to intercede on his and his team's behalf. 
Boys' Soccer Higlights



Earlier this year, our very own Alex Fogarty, made an appearance on RTÉ's PrimeTime. Representing the National Youth Council of Ireland (NYCI) and the Irish Second-Level Students Union (ISSU), Alex spoke about the proposed referendum for 'Extending the Voting Age to 16 and 17 years old.'

Unfortunately the Government announced that it will not proceed with a referendum on the voting age, the week before the PrimeTime appearance. So Alex couldn't actually speak as if the Referendum is going ahead. He did, however, go on to point out that we don't need to a referendum to lower the voting age in Local and European Elections. So although the Referendum has been postponed, NYCI and ISSU will continue to campaign for Vote@16 especially in relation to lobbying the Government to lower the voting age in Local and European Elections through legalisation, without the referendum.

Alex was very composed and well-spoken against his opposition, Noel Howard of the Irish Association of Social Care Workers (IASCW). Noel made the point that not all 16 or even 17 year olds are mature enough or don't have the knowledge to vote. 
won the first few rounds but then then the staff changed the game to "capture the flag" and the red team won that game.




Project


Music Department

Students receive a demonstration on how to complete a task. In pairs record each other carrying out the task. Students have to explain what they are drawing in the video. Videos are uploaded on Schoology for assessment by the teacher. Students are exposed to the same content three times.

Assisted by video tutorials on their ipads. Students drew a 3d object using Solidworks, created an assembly and printed a working drawing. Solidworks is vital part of DCG for leaving cert.


