TY is a year jam-packed with opportunities, experiences and amazing moments. I chose transition year as I have seen its benefits first hand from my brother and sister and I have always wanted to experience the things transition year has to offer. I didn't know what subjects I wanted to do in senior cycle or what I wanted to do in the future and I'm happy to say TY has helped me figure that out. Throughout the year you get to go on numerous trips where great memories and bonds are made, trips such as bog jumping in Liliput, sheep sheering at the ploughing championships, learning about entrepreneurs at the TY leaders event or even showing off your mini companies at the enterprise awards. The trips range from being interesting, academic experiences to fun, memorable bonding exercises. During transition year, you get to experience every subject in different modules, this is very useful as it gives you a better insight into the subjects you might pick in Senior cycle and it might also introduce you to new subjects that you enjoy. The array of things you learn and gain from trying out multiple subjects is amazing. You are given the opportunity to learn new languages, create interesting wood, metal and art pieces, bake and cook delicious foods and also learn about the exciting worlds of business, classics, and music. Transition year encourages you to take



part in Gaisce. Gaisce means 'great achievement' and it is in the spirit of this meaning that the program challenges young people to set and pursue goals in three



different categories; personal, community and physical, over a certain amount of weeks. This program lets students get involved in the community and take up new skills. If completed, you will be rewarded and it is a great achievement to have and can be written on your CV. Work experience is one of the most beneficial opportunities as it allows

you to get a feel for what the world of work is like and how it differs from school life. Work experience can also be useful in your picking of Senior subjects as it can really show you what work you genuinely like and what work you don't. Work experience is also very important for the students who are planning to go straight into work after secondary school. Students are provided with three weeks where they are expected to find and do work experience. Students are allowed to do their work experience in the same place for the three weeks or in completely different places, it is all the students pick based on their interests, likes, and dislikes. Transition year doesn't just focus on academics and future choices, it gives you the time to get involved in projects that you might not have done before such as 'cycle against suicide', 'the young scientist' or 'the young entrepreneur awards'.



There is a module during the year called 'Pay It Forward' in which the students are encouraged to set up a project that benefits others and has a good purpose. This year many amazing projects were organized such as 'Phoneless for the homeless' which was sleepover in the school where students who volunteered gave up their phones for 24 hours and got sponsored in an effort to raise money for the homeless, some students hosted bake sales to raise money for charities of their choice or used the money for other projects such as painting the bathrooms to promote good mental health, other students set up sport tournaments for younger years within the school to promote fitness and teamwork. During this module, some students helped with younger students or primary schools students and cleaned up around the school and Ratoath in an effort to benefit the community. Transition year pushes you out of your comfort zone but in the best way possible, it is a year where you can make new friendships and learn new skills. There are a lot of talks and small events throughout the year. We received talks on important topics such as bullying, driving safety and mental health. We also had people come in and teach us new skills such as drumming and Zumba, and even if you don't pick up these skills full time each event becomes a good bonding experience and memory. The activities and opportunities given to TY students help them become more confident and open. Transition year consistently promotes and encourages volunteering and putting yourself in new situations. Students have volunteered for things such as bag backing, painting for local business, special Olympics, the pink run against breast cancer, teaching proper oral hygiene, and the organising and set up of the school musical. All these events inspire students to be more social



and confident which are very useful traits to have. Transition year also offers classes on drama, news, film, and dance. These are all classes that wouldn't be taught in other years and it is important that they are being experienced during TY as these subjects may be the only things some people are interested in so hopefully these modules encourage students to get involved. Transition year has been a phenomenal year and has benefited my school life hugely in many different ways. I strongly recommend Transition year.


Goodwill & Harmony

Another great opportunity provided in the TY curriculum is Pay it forward is a class that lets students create opportunities to give back to others, thus paying your efforts forward for a helpful cause. Students can create such opportunities by embracing the programme and being creative coming up with ideas and fundraisers. Pay it forward is a class entirely up to the student to involve themselves in, with teachers only there to help and push students ideas. It is a major programme in TY which is what TY revolves around and keeps you busy. Here are some of the projects that students created this year.



Phoneless for the homeless: This was a project run to raise money for The Simon Community, a charity which focuses on the homeless crisis in Ireland. The main event was the sleepover that was held in the school hall including 90 students and teachers who volunteered their night and fundraised using sponsor cards. Some students raised €60 for the charity. Students also had to give their phones up for 24hrs as the name suggests. It was a great night overall and a fun way to fundraise money for a great cause.

Cookies for teachers: This project was run to simply be nice and give something back to the wonderful teachers. TY students prepared a recipe and ingredient list for making the cookies. The idea was created and put together in one P.I.F class. The students then spent their next P.I.F class baking these cookies and then handed them out to all the teachers in the school.



Rainbow day: Rainbow day was a fundraiser to help the musical costs. This day involved students wearing a certain colour which was specified for each year group. Students brought in money to wear their own clothes.

St Vincent de Paul Christmas Hampers: TY students organised to raise food and supplies for St. Vincent de Paul hamper appeal which happens annually around the country. They collect food hampers to give to disadvantaged families at Christmas. The students created a list of things to bring in and gave them to each rang, each rang also received boxes to put the items in. The students then collected the supplies and organised them into hampers ready for collection.



Christmas Door Competition: This competition is held yearly in the school and is run by TY students each year. The competition involves each rang making a Christmas themed door to spread cheer around the school. The TY team comes up with a criterion for judging and prizes for the winners, with categories for each rang to win these prizes.



Cleaning up of the Riverwalk: Another TY group organised the clean-up of the Riverwalk, they would go to the Riverwalk each P.I.F. class and pick up glass or rubbish with bin bags that they brought in.





The Student Leader's Congress was absolutely fantastic and we all look forward to returning next year.






As a whole, this year was extremely successful for the committee! We





Students' pursuit of creativity and cultural enrichment, for the development of the total individual is encouraged.



This Year in the Art Department

1st Years



This is pursued in a fun and active way through structured practical work, building the students qualities of imagination, originality, creativity and problem solving.

Our vision is that every student will not just be encouraged but actively and individually helped to explore, express, and communicate their ideas and develop their skills and understanding of art, craft and design. We support our students to actively engage in the artistic process in order to develop as effective and independent learners, and as critical and reflective thinkers with enquiring minds.

Our ambition to achieve national standards of excellence in the education of students in the creative, visual arts. We do this through the quality of our teaching and by introducing students to contemporary and traditional art practice. We endeavour to raise students' creative competence as well as their creative confidence.

This year we welcomed some new young artists to the Ratoath College Art Department. These new young artists have worked extremely hard this year and have created some amazing works of art.

Students have explored all the art elements. The Visual Elements are Line, Shape, Tone, Colour, Pattern, Texture and Form. These are the building blocks of composition in art.



Exploring shape and form students created pinch pot clay creatures. . It was great for all our first years to finally get their hands dirty and create an object!



Producing pinch pots is the most direct method people have of interacting with clay. We push, and the clay responds. We pinch, and again the clay responds. We can learn a huge amount simply through the experience of directly modifying the clay's form. Each pupil got to work on their own designs and the results were fantastic.

2nd Years

Lino Printing

This year through Printmaking 2nd Year students discovered and experimented with a new medium. The group created multiple -coloured lino prints based on different animals. This is a form of relief printing.



What is printmaking? Well, for those of you who don't know, printmaking is a form of art that involves transferring ink to paper. The process is capable of making multiple copies of the same artwork. Each individual copy is called a "PRINT" or an "IMPRESSION".




Graphic Design

Researching and developing ideas for a composition using found imagery and imagination, students created posters relating to different countries and places around the world.

Learning how the relationship between imagery and words can work together to form a strong graphic design poster.

Through discussion and expression of opin-




ions on the world, students learned from each other and learned about new worlds and places outside of the classroom walls.

iPad Painting David Hockney inspired

Taking inspiration from the incredible artist that is David Hockney students started using their apple gadgets to create iPad drawings and paintings.

The novelty of painting on an iPad was exciting and new. This is a new medium with fresh possibilities, requiring unorthodox techniques.



Students replaced their paint brush with their fingers and the canvas with the iPad.

Another innovation of iPad painting – sending your art at the touch of a button. Students sent their techno-sketches out to friends, who could pass them on, collect them or do what they like with the art work.

Set Painting: Hairspray the Musical 2017



Looking at different themes from ‘what a day, things that fly, awesome’.... Etc. this group created a collection of great art.

This past September Ms O Neill assembled a group of Transition Year students to give up many hours after school to design and create the sets for the upcoming school musical- Hairspray. We initially started by coming up with ideas for three different scenes: Mr. Pinky’s Hideaway, the living room and the record shop. After hours of browsing Pinterest and scribbling down any sort of an idea, we finally settled on our final ideas and made a rough plan of action.



As well as the three scenes, we also had many street scene boards and the main “Corny Collins Show” boards to paint. We all formed into separate groups to either work on the record shop, Mr. Pinky’s or the living room, and the others began the laborious task of covering the street scene boards in white paint to start on a clean canvas. The record shop used many cans of spray paint and tubes of black acrylic paint. It was a tedious task of carefully painting around the multi-coloured records with black paint, as to not ruin their shape.

Pinky’s began by covering the two canvases in pink paint, before mapping out the green wooden door and striped canopy. We left two topsy-turvy style windows to leave items in, like shoes or a dress.

mid-September, the living room was coming on well. It was covered in a bright yellow paint, and the intricate square pattern was almost finished. It was even complete with a

skirting board! The window had a glass-looking sheen, and the green curtains had realistic creases and folds. It was time for Mr. Pinky’s windows to be filled, so we started by separating one window with a shelf. On this we painted the iconic blue wig on a mannequin and a pair of red heels. In the other window, we designed a tailor’s mannequin wearing a pale blue skirt. We finished Mr. Pinky’s by adding some warm yellow window sills. The giant street scene boards were progressing well; they all had fresh layers of blue, green and yellow paint. We sketched out the topsy-turvy style windows, all in different shapes—some circular, some diamond, and some were trapeziums. We painted the window sills, added stormy looking skies outside, and even finished one of the boards with a “Baltimore” street sign.



Time was running out, and the show was in a couple of weeks. We all started staying back in school until 6pm or later. We had to add the finishing touches to majority of the boards, and complete the “Corny Collins Show” boards. On top of that, we had to paint the giant hairspray can that the woodwork teachers had made. We had a lot to do and not much time left.



As the musical rehearsals started being scheduled on Saturdays and Sundays, we decided we would dedicate our weekends to finishing this project. We added white and yellow snowflake shapes to the Corny Collins boards, touched up the lettering, and then we turned all our attention to the hairspray can. The words "Ultra Clutch" were delicately written onto the side of the can in white after completely covering it in pink paint. The same snowflake shapes were added to the can, and the cap was painted blue, white and silver.


time and effort you have put into after school art. We are truly so grateful. And you will always be a favourite of the transition years of 2017/2018.

Renowned for his portrayal of the human form, Freud is best known for his intimate, honest, often visceral portraits. Working only from life Freud's studio was intensely private and he mainly worked with those he was close to, often asking subjects to sit for hundreds of hours over multiple sittings to better capture the essence of their personality.

Madrid



Madrid '18 was the first overseas art trip to happen in Ratoath College, and it was a trip to never forget. Departing early on the 26th of March, the small group of thirteen departed to Dublin Airport, each person a little bit sleep deprived.

That evening is when we visited the first of three museums, Museo Nacional Centro de Arte Reina Sofía, Spain's national museum of 20th Century art, named after Queen Sofía. war paintings in history. It was not just paintings that we got to see in the Reina Sofía but also films such as Iván Zulueta's *Rapture* and 3D pieces like Ree Mortan's *To Each Concrete Man*. Our art-packed day led us to have a little rest in the gorgeous courtyard garden centred in the gallery, before finishing our visit and heading off to dinner in a local Spanish restaurant.



After dinner, still hungry for Spanish delicacies, we roamed Madrid for close to an hour asking locals where we could find a churreria, eventually finding one, sitting down and buying an absurd number of churros.



Day two was a gallery packed day, we began our day at the Thyssen-Bornemisza Museum, a short walk from our hotel in central Madrid. Here we discovered our passion of recreating works of art and finding some doppelgängers while doing so.



The Thyssen being one of the groups personal favourite galleries included works by Vincent van Gogh, Paul Gauguin, Edgar Degas, Edvard Munch and Salvador Dalí.



Later that day we got to experience the Art of Museo del Prado, the national gallery of Spain, home to some of the world's finest collections dating from the 12th Century to the early 20th century, such as Diego Velázquez's *Las Meninas*, Francisco Goya's *The Third of May 1808*, depicting the executions of Patriots from Madrid and Goya's *Saturn Devouring his son*.



Later we headed off to an Andy Warhol exhibition which wasn't on the itinerary but a must on all our to-do lists. The exhibition was incredible, full of colour and an interactive room with silver foil pillow-shaped balloons flying around. Andy Warhol's pop art added an extra form of art that couldn't be missed on our trip.



so many lessons, be on time, don't eat raw chicken and watch where you're going because you might fall over a boulder just as Ailbhe did.



Reeling in the years

History is Ratoath College continues to flourish at both JC & LC level. Our Junior students have been exploring the nature of history in Ireland, Europe & the wider world from humanity's origins during the Stone Age until more modern experiences such as the Cold War or the Troubles in Northern Ireland. This allows them to undertake a wide variety of tasks to further their understanding of how our world has been shaped by the events of the past. These can range from researching their favourite



Celtic myths to re-enacting famous battles such as the D-Day landings of 1942.

In TY our students have the opportunity to experience a wide variety of modules which cover areas of history they may

never have been given the chance to explore. One module focuses on the hit TV show 'Reeling in the Years' where students create their own version of the programme, passed on a specific time period. Students also have the opportunity to examine the causes and results of terrorism across the globe, from the domestic to the religious.

In Senior Cycle our students further develop their historical conscience and examine Ireland's struggle for

independence and its aftermath along. We study the rise of dictatorships across Europe in the 1930s, a topic more relevant now than at any other time in recent memory, and how Europe and the world was affected by the outbreak of WWII. We also examine how the United States became the world superpower it is today and how it struggled with race relations, propaganda & fear-mongering over the last century. Students also undertake a research project worth 20% of their final exam in a topic of their choosing, this year we have students researching Medgar Evers, Nelly Bly and Operation Anthropoid, among others.

Over the Easter break this year there was a fifth year trip for the French students to Normandy for four days.


We met up at the bus stop to leave for the airport early Friday morning, we were all cold and tired but couldn't wait to get to France.



Arriving to sports day on the Italians first official day although was a complete change of pace, everyone came out in full form and put everything into our sports day, no matter how cold they found it. The Italians, although, did not have the regular Irish experience. Unfortunately, a storm was brewing and by the fifth day, school had been cancelled and houses were on lockdown. Our trips had to be cancelled and we were now left with the responsibility of entertaining 27 Italian students for two days within the comforts of our own homes. Luckily everyone pulled together, our days and nights were spent making home made carbonara and trying desperately to educate the Italians on the spirituality behind a spice bag. The Italians saw true Irish culture, although it may have not been what they expected and visited both the Guinness storehouse and Katy's chipper, maybe more times than we'd like to admit. But overall the week we thought we would dread ended up being over in a flash. Teary-eyed goodbyes and "See you later's" were shared and just like that, the Irish students were already planning for our trip to Parma in the months to follow.

We boarded our bus to the airport at 4:30, the 21st of March. We were anything less than well rested and nerves



were running high. We enjoyed our Burger King breakfast and in no time, we were sat on the plane ready for take-off. The plane landed in Milan airport early that morning and we were greeted outside Liceo Scientifico Statale G.Ulvili in Parma by our Italian friends. The second day we visited the Parma town hall and was greeted by the town mayor. Our third day in Italy was by far the best day of our trip when we visited the cinque Terre. The competitive-types were really shown clear this day, the Irish, as expected were too lazy to run around getting the answers, which did not make the Italians very happy, they spent the day sprinting around the town trying as hard as they could to win us the prize of a Liceo Scientifico t-shirt. Saturday morning, we woke up, once again, at 6am for school,



something we weren't too pleased about, we spent a small amount of time in the school and then went shopping for the rest of the day. That evening we went to the Bebob disco in Parma. 
The Story of My Life




