Finally, we would like to wish all those sitting exams in June the very best of luck and every success in the future.



'Lead the scene and keep it green!'



2021-2023

Our Green Schools Leadership Team was formed in January 2022, in an effort to take a whole school approach to improving our school environment. We could see the world around us changing and beginning to take note of their plastic use and we wanted to be ambassadors for change in our own community. We knew we would all have to understand our individual and collective responsibilities in order to take real action in our school and bring about meaningful change.

It started with a desire to reduce the use of single-use plastics in our school. Our project started with monitoring litter within our school community and creating awareness about the damage single-use plastics can do to our environment. We gathered our information by interviewing school staff, students,

caretakers, local business people and parents. We started our RC Green Schools Leadership Team which comprises of highly motivated students, management, caretakers, parents and teachers. Our extensive research and monitoring showed us that students using single-use water bottles and teachers using single-use coffee cups were found to be the largest obstacles in relation to reducing letter and waste in our school.

Our 'Lead the Scene and Keep it Green' campaign started in September 2021. Since we started the project, we liaised with our Principal and our Management team, to put in place a ban of single-use plastic bottles in the school and a ban of single-use coffee cups in our school. Three water-refill fountains have been installed in our school. We designed our own unique

reusable water bottles and coffee mugs. We designed our own Ratoath College logo and slogan which is printed on our school handbooks. student dialanns and teacher journals. Our uniquely designed 'Keep it Green' posters were professionally printed and are now visible in every classroom in our school and in all GP areas. We painted a large mural of our 'Lead the Scene and Keep it Green' image on the wall at the entrance to our school.



We then developed and delivered a 'Keep it Green' presentation to all staff and students in our school. This included information on the impact of plastic on sea life, the health hazards to humans and the importance of reducing, reusing and recycling within our school community. It also explained our new 'Keep it Green' whole school initiatives, so that our entire school community would know what we were collectively doing as a school, to combat our litter and waste issues in our school. We also held a 'Keep it Green' Month in September 2022 and in December 2022, where all students were presented with four lessons on Sustainability, Circular Economy, Litter and Waste and Climate Change. This gave students and teachers an opportunity to explore the topic of sustainability as a class and to communicate their individual and collective concerns as a class. Both students are teachers are rewarded with weekly and end of term Pizza Parties and certificates for exemplary work in relation to keeping their classrooms clean and litter free.

In September 2022 and we supplied every student in the school with their own RC Reusable Water Bottle and every staff member with a RC Reusable Coffee mug free of charge. All students and staff were encouraged to bring in their own lunchbox and dispose of any waste in their lunch box and recycle it at home. There is now only one 'Paper Only' recycling bin placed in every classroom in the school and our Green Schools Leadership Team monitor all our classrooms on a weekly basis.

Classes are rewarded each term with a pizza party for their commitments to our initiatives and teachers are rewarded on a weekly basis for their dedication to our cause with a certificate and gift. We designed a large Green Notice Board to highlight all important initiatives taking place in our school and to highlight our successful classes and teachers who have won our green awards each term.









We have noticed a huge decline in the use of single-use plastics which was our target, at the beginning of this project. At the start of 2020, hundreds of plastic bottles and coffee cups were collected weekly in our school and now we only use plastic bottles for art projects to highlight important topics like recycling and sustainability, so we feel we have achieved awareness amongst our fellow students. Our campaign has led to a complete ban on single-use plastic bottles and coffee cups in our school, saving an average of over 6,000 bottles so far from landfill. We promote all our 'Keep it Green' initiatives on all our Social Media pages (Twitter, Instagram and our school website) and we hope our campaign has helped the wider community to realise the need to reduce their use of single-use plastics for a sustainable future.







Our Art Department also worked on a wonderful Green Schools Sculpture Project. To gain inspiration for our sculpture pieces, students went on a day trip to Lough Boora Sculpture Park in Co. Offaly. For many years, Lough Boora was a working bog and now it's home to many sculpture pieces created by Artists from Ireland and all around the world. Art students in Ratoath College decided to use recycled plastic bottles and natural materials in their own designs. Students drew plastic bottles and incorporated them into our final designs and based their sculptures on an environmental message that meant something personal to us and our school. Their work is displayed in an outdoor display garden in our school.

Students and staff in our Autism Unit (lonad Arkle) joined forces with our Green Schools Leadership Team and decided to create our own community garden. This was to teach the students the importance of plants to our environment. They learned how to plant and water their plants and look after them. They planted tomatoes to learn how to grow vegetables and created a rota to share the responsibilities that helped show teamwork makes any task easier.

The Green School leadership team ran a Green Schools Poster Competition in January 2022 with the theme 'Say No to Single Use Plastic'. A 6th year student produced the winning poster which is both artistic and informative and it is attached here.







The team ran a wonderful Green Schools Action Day in December 2022, where we introduced our Green Schools Mascot to our school 'Scruffy'. Scruffy reward all students and staff who walked, cycled or scooted to school that morning with treats. We also hosted our first ever 'clothes swop' event. We wanted to highlight the important transition in awareness and attitude from a 'take, wear, dispose' approach to clothing (linear economy) to a 'care, share, repair' approach (circular economy), while shifting our mindsets away from ownership and explore ideas like renting and leasing options, second hand clothes shops, charity shops as well as clothes swapping with friends.

The Green Schools leadership team are very aware of the importance of looking more closely at striving for a 'circular economy' and how 'fast fashion' and the production of cheap, poor-quality clothing results in overwhelming amounts of consumption and waste. We now realise, that all the elements of fast fashion; trend replication, rapid production, low quality and competitive pricing, add up to having a detrimental impact on the planet and the people involved in garment production.







As a school we are becoming very aware of our individual and collective responsibilities in relation to sustainability and climate change. We are also trying to encourage a collective move from a 'linear economy' and towards a more 'circular economy' where we look towards initiatives that promote reducing, reusing and recycling materials where possible.

Ratoath College worked with the Green-Schools programme to help take practical actions to mitigate and adapt to climate change. ClothesPod is a sponsor of the Green-Schools programme, aiming to bring further sustainability and environmentally friendly solutions to our school. ClothesPod are 100% Irish with over 25 years' award-winning experience in the textile recycling industry, employing over 50 people full time in Ireland.



In January this year we coordinated with students, staff and teachers to participate in a clothing collection day in our school to help us make a positive impact on our environment. Going forward, we hope to help ensure clothes are kept at their highest value during use and re-enter the economy after use, never ending up in a landfill. Through raising awareness and educating our students and staff about the importance to re-use, repair and repurpose an idem you no longer wear we hope to make a difference and encourage real change.

The RC Little Free Library is a free book exchange initiative where staff are encouraged to take a book and return a book, promoting a sustainable way of reading. Purchasing books for one time use can be expensive and can also lead to a lot of paper waste. The RC Little Free Library will give us an opportunity to reuse resources that we have while also expanding access to books and encourage more people to discover the joy in reading.

Ratoath College will be taking part in the 'Take 1 Programme' which looks at education for sustainable development in Post Primary Schools. We will be actively participating in May Day on May 9th and we have already started our fundraising activities to pursue our Wild Garden and our Metre of Meadow in our school.

ENVIRONMENTALISTS

ustainable Development Goal 3, regarding 'Good Health and Well-being' is one of the 17 sustainable development goals, established by the United Nations in 2015. The official wording is 'To ensure healthy lives and promote well-being for all, at all ages.' Here in Ratoath College, we like to 'Think Globally, but Act Locally' and this slogan is an integral part of everything we do in our school. Over the next fifteen years, we as students will not only directly experience the outcome of SDGs and plans but will also be the key driver for their successful implementation. For this reason, it is vital that we build a platform for discussion and create the conditions for active engagement.

ur Team was formed as we are all members of our Green School Leadership Team and the Wellbeing Team in our school. All five of us were extremely eager to coordinate and lead this entire project. All members of our Green Schools Leadership Team voted to ensure we were worthy nominees and capable of leading this project on behalf of our school. Kate and Saoirse and two 6th year Cinnire students in our school and so we knew as student leaders, they would have the confidence, management skills and the collaborative skills to coordinate this project. Matthew, Leo and Ross are three 5th year students who are passionate about sustain-

ability and health and wellbeing so we knew they would drive our project forward as they are already involved in numerous other initiatives and clubs in the school promoting similar important issues.

ecent global issues (Covid-19/War in Ukraine/ Climate Change) have directly and indirectly impacted the lives of young people worldwide and therefore; we see

an important need to promote and celebrate sustainability and healthy lives and well-being in order to build resilient and prosperous societies and school communities. Covid-19 is threatening decades of progress in global health e.g., the prevalence of anxiety and depression is on the

rise. It is a well-known fact that war has multiple negative psychological impacts on both individuals directly involved and even those not involved and as the war in Ukraine is so mediatized, we feel students worldwide may be negatively affected regardless of age, gender or involvement in the conflict. Climate change and increasing temperatures have been shown to increase levels of allergens and pollutants present in the air, leading to worsened air quality and emerging evidence suggests that poor air quality can negatively impact mental health, in particular depression and anxiety.







The UN SDG Report 2022 tells us that cascading and interlinked crises are putting the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development in grave danger, along with humanity's very own survival. The Report highlights the severity and magnitude of the challenges before us. The confluence of crises, dominated by COVID-19, climate change, and conflicts, are creating spin-off impacts on food and nutrition, health, education, the environment, and peace and security, and affecting all the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). The Report details the reversal of years of progress in eradicating poverty and hunger, improving health and education, providing basic services, and much more. It also points out areas that need urgent action in order to rescue the SDGs and deliver meaningful progress for people and the planet by 2030.

We are encouraging everyone to 'Think globally but act locally', in relation to addressing important issues like acting sustainability, ensuring they prioritise their health and wellbeing and celebrate implementing environmentally conscious and healthy solutions into everyday decisions and actions. So instead of waiting for grand breakthroughs to 'fix the world' we can all act locally and raise awareness in our own school communities about the importance of acting sustainably, ensuring good health, healthy lifestyles. We produced an Eco-health and Well-being video promoting how our school implements environmentally conscious and healthy initiatives to raise awareness and celebrate positive steps towards taking action. We believe that by acting sustainably here in our school and keeping it litter free, this has a hugely positive affect on our overall health and wellbeing. So, we are now challenging other schools, to do what we did, and look for ways their SCHOOL promotes sustainability, healthy lives and wellbeing for their students. We hope our video inspires.

Throughout this project, we developed the value of hope and friendship and acted on our group vision of a more positive and sustainable future in our school. We considered how hope enabled us to see the potential for change and fuelled our steps towards realising it. We believe our project has reignited hope in our school community and presents our personal applications of hope and how embracing hope can give birth to a vision of a positive sustainable future and inspire action to bring that vision about.

As human beings, as a social clan, as a school community, we have a need to live within supportive environments where we are nurtured and can thrive together, where there is a strong commitment to the well-being of our school community as a whole. We are fundamentally designed to live this way. Building friendships with one another is not just "a nice thing to do" but it is an imperative for our survival as humans, and for our well-being as a local and global community. As a team, we have built friendships for life, not only with our fellow students but also with our teachers, secretaries, caretakers and management in our school.







Throughout this project, we feel like we have all developed skills in environmental advocacy. Advocates have been telling the public to recycle, reduce, and reuse for decades now, and that advice is still relevant today, but we learned that our fellow students respond better to seeing progress in action through a motivational video. Although we all realise systemic change is necessary to alter our current trajectory, small day-to-day actions can still help spread a more sustainable worldview. Together, thought and action can add up to make a real difference, especially when these thoughts and actions are celebrated and promoted in a positive, inspiring and personal way. Changing hearts and minds, building public will, and thereby influencing political will and judicial engagement on any issue requires that advocates first connect with people through language and stories rooted in values we authentically share. We have seen how our video has helped us to be environmental advocates in a way that shares our own unique and inspiring sustainability journey.

We can honestly say that our environmental knowledge has grown and developed organically as we researched and explored this sustainability project over several months. We have a deeper insight into how sustainability, climate change, health and wellbeing and all 17 Sustainable Development Goals are directly linked and interconnected. We know globally, nine out of ten people breathe polluted air. And even worse, seven million people worldwide die prematurely from air pollution every year, according to the World Health Organization (WHO). Much of the same pollutants causing our air pollution crisis are also causing our climate crisis. Knowledge is power, and we understand that by learning more and more about our climate challenge and the responsibility that all sectors hold in addressing the issues involved, we can add our voice to these issues that are shaping the climate debate as well as emerging, evidence-based data that directly relates to changes in our climate our health and our well-being.

This is just the beginning of our Young Environmentalist journey! We have seen so many positive impacts from taking part in this project, we only have a desire to continue our work towards a more sustainable life in order to rescue the SDGs and help deliver meaningful progress for people and the planet by 2030. Because of our participation in this 'Eco-health and Well-being' video project, we have recently connected with many other schools in Louth and Meath to work together to pursue projects collectively. Identifying and setting goals collectively to pursue common environmental goals, based upon the mission and values of each school, strengthens our identity and our motivation to take more action. We hope that by working together with our neighbouring schools, we will deepen relationships and provide students and staff in our school with opportunities to work in unity with likeminded individuals and leaders in other schools, towards our common sustainability goals. Research shows that collaborative problem-solving leads to better outcomes. People are more likely to take calculated risks that lead to innovation if they have the support of a team behind them. We are excited to see what future group projects and collaborative initiatives are on the horizon.



In the build up to our school musical "Sister Act", our Cinnirí and the 6th year Rang Conaty undertook a huge fundraising event; "Nuns on the Run" in the last week of September. In order to promote the school musical, 10 cinnirí volunteered to dress up as nuns and compete against 10 teachers who were dressed up as students. The "nuns" and "students" bravely took on the 10-man relay race on our athletics track, which had a number of obstacles placed along the way!

The sign up sheet for the teachers may have taken some time to be filled but in the end we had 10 teachers who were eager to take on the "nuns". The teachers were led by their Bainisteoir, Mr Horan, who was very keen to take on the role. The teachers had prepared and trained leading up to the event and according to Mr Horan, in his pre-race interview, although they did have an unknown 80

weak link, the teachers definitely had a few tricks up their sleeve.

The cinnirí were more than delighted to be taking on the teachers in "Nuns on the Run", even if it did mean they had to dress up as nuns and run around the athletics track! I had the lucky job of being the Bainisteoir of the "Nuns" and I can definitely confirm there were no weak links within this team of nuns!

There were some last minute changes to both teams, for the teachers Ms Bruce had a last minute injury but fortunately Mr Flanagan was willing to step in and for the nuns, Luca Fogarty was called to a soccer match but Sophie Maher took his spot.

As the school gathered on the athletic track, they were supplied with excellent commentary by Mr McAuley, Abi Hunt and Alicia



Cunningham. They had in depth analysis on each student and teacher, including the bainisteoirí and provided excellent commentary throughout the race! The "Nuns" and "Students" made their way to the track, completed their warm up and were ready to start the race. Each competitor had to sprint 200 metres with obstacles along the way. The obstacles included: hurdles, balancing along a bench, throwing wet sponges into the bainisteoirí's buckets, popping a balloon on a chair and jumping over the iconic sports day wooden horse!

The race was level throughout, with Dara Kavanagh and Mr Farrell proving to be an even match in the first leg of the relay. They passed the batons to Danny Colgan and Mr Jordan who were both equally as determined to beat each other. Keith Carroll and Mr O'Dwyer were next to run and although it was



The scambio scolastico (exchange programme) between Ratoath College and Liceo Ulivi had been going for several years, but was interrupted over the last three years by the COVID pandemic so we were delighted to be able to recommence the relationship between the two schools, as this is such a fantastic opportunity for students to make new friends and immerse themselves in the cultures of Italy and Ireland.

experience going to Italian lessons in the Liceo Ulivi and a warm welcome from Giovanni Brunazzi, il direttore (our Italian Mr. Meehan), who spoke to us about Giacomo Ulivi, whom the school was named after, and how he had lost his life as part of the resistance against the Italian Fascists in World War Two. Signor Brunazzi also explained how this links to today's society and how important the project of the European Union remains for young people and for peace in our countries. That evening we were treated to a lovely meal all together of tortelli and prosciutto di Parma, Parma being genuinely one of THE food capitals of Italy, the Italian students were very proud to show us the food on offer in their city.

The students of Liceo Ulivi brought us on a wonderful tour of their hometown of Parma and they were full of fantastic knowledge about architecture and history, which no doubt our students can match when the Italians come to Ireland! Parma is an exquisite medieval town and perhaps the highlight was the spectacular Teatro Farnese, a Renaissance theatre made mostly of wood that took our breath away.





We also enjoyed a wonderful visit to the world-famous Renaissance city of Florence and student's jaws dropped at the beautiful architecture, especially the beautiful Duomo di Firenze. Some of our students managed to squeeze in a whistle stop tour of Le Gallerie degli Uffizi (the Uffizi Gallery) while others enjoyed the local pizza and gelato on offer.

On Saturday we visited a cheese factory where genuine Parmesan cheese is made, once again none of our students were left in any doubt of the pride the parmegiani feel for their food! Afterwards, we went to the Castle of Torrechiara, which one student remarked was like something out of a fairytale. For the rest of the weekend it was free time with the host families, some went to Milan, Thomas went for a dip in the sea by Le Cinque Terre and Harry even went skiing!

All in all, it was a wonderful, unique week away in Italy but perhaps the best thing was the friendships made, both between the Irish and the Italians but also between our own Ratoath College students. 
2nd Year Trip to Valkenburg

September.



We were invited by Councillor Nick Killian to see Leinster House and learn about its history and about 0ireachtas Éireann. It was a great opportunity for the council to educate ourselves on how our country is run, and it helped us think about how we could further emphasise the principles of democracy in Ratoath College.

After a bus into Dublin and bringing our bags through security, we were led up to the Dáil chamber. Our tour guide told us about the structure of the chamber, where the different parties and other government members sit, and the different roles in the Dáil. We learned about the technology used to keep everything running smoothly, as well as how to running of the government has changed over time. Later in the trip, we got to visit the upper house of the Oireachtas, Seanad Éireann. We learned about the role the Seanad plays in Irish government, the structure of the house, and how seanadóirí are selected.

Throughout the trip, we also got to learn about the story of Leinster House through the years. This visit not only taught us about democracy, but also history and architechture! The building started off as the Ducal Palace of the Dukes of Leinster, and also for a period was the headquarters of the Royal Dublin Society. This history was clear everywhere in the building, though some places were less obvious then others. It was quite interesting to hear that the back of the Dáil chamber was a stage for some time, and even more suprising to learn that the grand entrance corridor to the chamber, filled with portraits of former Taoisigh of Ireland, was originally just a corridor to the kitchens! Leinster House was also filled with incredible art, with portraits and paintings lining the corridors, and intricate plaster decoration in the Seanad chamber. Getting to see the building was really an unforgettable experience. We had a break for lunch, then got a chance to discuss the trip outside the building. We also were able to meet Thomas Byrne, the Minister of State for Sport and Physical Education. He told us about the work he is doing with sport in Ireland, such as discussions on the future Olympics. It was a great chance for Student Council members who are interested in working with PE in the school to learn about what kind of things are being done on a national level, and for all the council to learn about the work that Dáil Ministers do.

This trip was a great experience. The council members who went on it really got to bond, and learn more about Irish democracy. 
Camogie



My experience of Sign Language Club and What I've learned - By Eve Griffin

My first experience with sign language in our school was during the summer awards of 2022 when Mr. Gueret signed the lyrics to a song for the whole school and taught everyone how to applaud in sign language (jazz hands). I immediately knew that this was something I could really benefit from. Other clubs in the school I've been a part of do not compare when it comes to Sign. I'm the only person of my year group in the whole thing yet everybody makes me feel so welcome and friendly. Every week, you're signing with a new partner and getting to know them through the marginalized language. Every person I meet, I'm teaching them how to say what their name is, ask someone how they're feeling or even how to order a drink at a restaurant. The club also hosts amazing days like our Movie Day where every member baked or bought in order to watch a movie called" Coda" about a teenager in America being the only hearing person out of her deaf and dependent family. I'd recommend the Sign Language club to anybody. You can either do it for fun like with your friends at lunch or you could do it seriously, like being able to take a test in May for your beginner's certificate and a golden badge.

My personal experience with sign language was seriously aided by this club. When I was a toddler, I used to communicate using Makaton sign, which is a way to develop communication skills which helps stimulate sounds and words. This is probably why I picked up sign in the school's club so fast, but anyone can use it! And I think everybody should. Who knows who you'll meet in life? Or maybe you know a family member who knows a deaf person, something as a simple as learning how to say" Hello, how are you?" Goes such a long way that hearing people can't even begin to comprehend. Normalizing the language with things like our school's club benefits society in ways that may seem small to us but aren't at all for the deaf community. For example, most deaf people need interpreters for everyday life. Jobs like interpreters for things like television programs, classes or even musical concerts are important. I'd recommend looking up Justina Miles on YouTube, she was the interpreter for Rihanna's Super Bowl performance. Or even if you wanted to see Sign Language in film, I'd recommend" Coda" or "A Silent Voice" as some starters. The best thing you could do to learn sign, though, is to drop by the club in the prayer room during lunch on a Tuesday. You'll be extremely surprised about how much you can learn in just one day!



GEOGRAPHICAL INVESTIGATION



Newgrange is a 5,200 year old passage tomb located in the Boyne Valley in Irelands Ancient East.


As part of the 5th year Art History curriculum our lucky 5th year art students got the opportunity to visit this monument that is only on our door step.

Built by Stone Age farmers, the mound is 85m (279ft) in diameter and 13m (43ft) high, an area of about 1 acre. A passage measuring 19m (62ft) leads into a chamber with 3 alcoves. The passage and chamber are aligned with the rising sun on the mornings around

the Winter Solstice. Newgrange is surrounded by 97 large stones called kerbstones some of which are engraved with megalithic art; the most striking is the entrance stone.

Newgrange was built by a farming community that prospered on the rich lands of the Boyne Valley. We also visited Knowth and Dowth which are similar mounds to Newgrange. Together these mounds have been designated a World Heritage Site by UNESCO.

Newgrange is the jewel in the crown of Ireland's Ancient East.





The Transition Year (TY) programme is a standalone one-year programme for students that bridges the gap between junior and senior cycle. TY is an opportunity for students to take a slip road off the busy highway of exams, to study and experience a different kind of roadmap. Through the many workshops TY students have participated in this year, they have flexed their acting muscles, challenged the perceptions and attitudes of body image, taken on the challenges of urban orienteering and even tried their hands at mastering the skills of a segway.

In the month of December, we were delighted to welcome back Santa, Mrs. Claus, the elves and the students of Ratoath National and St. Paul's to Ratoath College Christmas village. The success of this project rests in the hands of the core team of TY students who worked tirelessly to ensure it was a success. We look forward to many more exciting Christmas villages here in the school.

All TYs had an opportunity to experience numerous significant learning days and trips. They have travelled the length and breadth of the country with visits to Belfast, Meath, Westmeath, Dublin, where they have visited the historic sights of Belfast, walked in the footsteps of artists, experienced farming life and traditions, splashed in the bogs of Lilliput to name but a few.



The TY timetable is a rotating timetable which sees the year split into sessions.
